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There has just been a huge shake out. Ainscough bought GWS, something we had predicted for a few months, and then, out of the blue, Finning buys Hewden Stuart. This makes it the proud owner of about 500 mobile and tower cranes and 1600 platt at the same time Lavendon has managed to

forms! Almost at the same time Lavendon has managed to strengthen its already strong position by buying Lex and Plettac to add to its Nationwide operation.

The implications are enormous and will take time to become clear. The biggest question is what will Hewden's new Canadian owners do with the lifting division? Finning's experience is in selling Caterpillar products – hiring out cranes and access platforms is "a whole new ball game". There are few clues in the official statements coming from Finning, but Richard Baldwin has immediately expressed an interest in buying cranes if they become available. His chances look slender in the light of information given to *Cranes & Access* (see this month's "Sharewatch").

So what is driving the big shake-out? Two factors seem to be at play - chance and low rates. The chance factor led to Hewden, GWS, PTP and Lex coming onto the market at more or less the same time as senior management could not generate the profits required to keep shareholders happy. This is where the low rates come in. Rates are low as this month's survey proves. Ainscough and Nationwide believe that consolidation will let them strengthen rates. History is not on their side -- the British Crane Hire Corporation and GWS itself evolved with the same goal. What is really needed is tougher regulations that make it more difficult for companies to cut corners and rates. Compulsory MOTs for road going equipment, a realistic level of road tax, and much stricter operator training requirements would all hurt in the short term but be a great help in the long run.
